# REBELS IN MUTINY

FIVE KILLED AND TWELVE WOUNDED ON AMERICAN SIDE OF FIGHTING LINE.

### CONCESSIONS ANGER MADERO'S MEN

Colonel of Fourth United States Cavalry Protests to Both Armies Against Firing . Across Border.

EL PASO, Tex., May 8.—General Matero's army made a flerce attack on luares, as a result of concessions made to the Federal Government. The attack, however, ended in a careful retreat of the insurrectos under cover of darkness after a day of continuous skirmishing.

The 150 rebels who opened fire on the federals not only captured some of the outposts, but earried the fightng into Juarez.

The casualties of the rebels and federals are not known, but five persons on the American side of the line were killed and 12 wounded.

Colonel Steever of the Fourt United States Cavalry, protested to both armies against the fire into American territory. He sent two messengers with his protests. One man bore a flag of truce and another an American flaz. His protest to Madero read:

'in the name of the President and the Government of the United States I bereby protest against the men under your command handling hir arms in such a way that bullets fall into United States territory, as is happening

Nearly 1000 American troops were sed on the border, keeping the growds back and ready to respond to any orders from Washington.

#### ACCIDENT BENDS HEAVY IRON BARS

Young Beast Falls Through Opening And is Badly Mangled When Found-Was Pet of

A tragedy marked the arrival of the Al G. Barnes Wild Animal Circus in Oregon City Sunday night. It was only a baby lion that was killed, but it was the pet of Mr. Barnes and his legion of employes. The little animal was devoured by another cub only a few weeks older than its victim, and "Ruth," one of the performing ele-phants was indirectly the cause. Every person connected with the circus was affected by the death of the little an-

The baby lion that was killed was born three weeks ago. "Nellie," its mother, is a fierce beast, and Mr Barnes, fearing she would kill the cubs there were three of them—had them removed from the cage. At Medford he bought a mother of a litter of puppies and she became the foster mother of the little lions. She and her adopted brood were placed in a cage divided in the center by iron bars. in the other half of which were "Juli-et" and her family of little ones.
