Taxpayer Pleads for Good Roads. Editor Enterprise: Some persons are praising and some are finding fault with Mr. Jaggar, our Clackamas roadmaster. I am in favor of good roads first and all the time. I have watched several of our road supervisors work in the past four years and have noticed the great need of a headmaster. I have seen roads plowed and scraped to center making a fill of loose dirt as late as October and November. No need to tell a webfoot what the result was. Road road costing the county \$4000 per mile only lasted two winters and was full of holes and ruts.
