ELYVILLE TO GET CHEMICAL ENGINE ORDINANCE INTRODUCED PROVIDING FOR PURCHASE OF ONE FOR \$750. RAILWAY CROSSING IS CONSIDERED. Committee Named To Find Out If It Is Feasible To Increase Width of Washington Street.

An ordinance providing for the purchase of a chemical fire engine for the Elyville district was introduced at a meeting of the City Council Thursday evening.

Upon motion the City Attorney was ordered to report on the legal provisions regarding the neglect of property-owners to remove grass in the streets in front of their premises.

The council ordered that Fourteenth street be constructed by contract, and a resolution providing for the asking of bids was adopted.

Upon motion the street committee was ordered to report on the sewer on Twelfth street between Taylor and Jackson.

A committee composed of Messrs. Myers, Anderson, Rodke and the Mayor was named to look into the feasibility of increasing the width of Washington street from 30 to 40 feet.

The Street Committee was instructed to confer with C. D. Latourette, attorney for the Hawley Pulp & Paper Company in regard to the ralling the company has constructed on Main street near its mill.

to have been forgotten until Dr. Carl brought it up. Dr. Carl called attention to the mill on Eighth street by the court house and urged that the council be asked to examine the law forbidding hitching posts and erect other-in various parts of the city.

The committee then reported that there was not a property owner from the woolen mill on the south to Busch's store on the north who would permit the erection of posts of rails in front of his property.

A motion to urge the Congressmen to push the matter of dredging the Clackamas rapids was carried.

The second matter up for discussion was the Clackamas Southern Railway project. The committee appointed reported that owing to a misunderstanding it had had only two hours in which to look over the books of the company and the report was only partial.

G. B. Dimick, secretary of the railway, and the directors and made a strong and convincing speech on the work and plans of the road. Both reports covered much the same ground, the following being their important features:

The present Clackamas Southern Railway is a continuation of the original company organized several years ago, of which F. M. Swift was president.
