HIGHEST PRICE IS
PAID FOR BARLEY

The barley market reached its highest price for the season Monday. Sales of the 1911 crop at \$30.50 in the interior, or \$34 a ton for brewing have been confirmed and the excitement among the trade is intense.

The deal at the highest figure was made in Garfield county, but there are reports that the same price is being offered in some of the better sections.

Dealers say that it is hard to purchase feed barely except at the same price as brewing, because growers say there is no difference in quality. It is reported that Eastern brewers are in the market for anything in the barley line.

The wheat market is showing an increased trade at unchanged prices. Farmers are seemingly of the opinion that the price is about to its high level and for that reason are inclined to let go more freely than since the harvest started.

Trade in oats is firm but quiet, with \$25 the general price for No. 1 white.

CATTLE MARKET STEADY.

Cows and Heifers Bring Fancy Prices and Veal is in Demand.

The Portland Union Stock Yards Company reports as follows:

Following are receipts of livestock on this market for the past week: Cattle 1557, calves 127, hogs 1885, sheep 8138.

Although the week opened with a fair run of cattle, receipts have been very light since Tuesday and prices remain steady to strong with best steers bringing \$5.75, medium steers \$5.50, lighter and thinner stuff all the way from \$4.75 to \$5.25. Buyers are anxious to secure good cattle as the demand for the past week has considerably exceeded the supply. Cows and heifers continue to bring fancy prices for best qualities, best heifers selling from \$4.60 to \$5, cows \$4.75. Very few calves on the market and good veal in demand, best light calves readily brought \$7.35 on this week's market. Bulls and stags remain

steady at former quotations with very few offerings.

That the demand for hogs is on the increase is evidenced by the fact that buyers are making less distinction between rough hogs and the well finished 175 to 225 pound porker that has formerly commanded almost their entire attention. Hogs weighing around 300 to 350 pounds are bringing \$7.75 and stockers are also quoted at \$7.75. As there have been no well finished medium weight swine on the market for some time speculation is rife as to the price buyers would be willing to pay.

Monday's sheep market was a good one but as receipts continued to increase during the week and still more mutton in sight for next week's market, prices in this division are very weak. Best wethers sold for \$3.65 on Monday but hardly brought \$3.25 at the close of the week's marketing. ewes opened at \$2.10 and closed at \$2.60. Best lambs now selling around 5c. No increase is expected as long as these heavy receipts continue.
