KOBASL) in the other respects is the brigherhood of man, that idea of humanitarians, resugnized so freely as in the efforts now being made to prevent the fearfully high loss of life in mine explosions. The gov ernments, state and federal, are co-operating to lessen the annual total rtality and injuries. With that end in view the Washington authorities are sending throughout the country exhibits of safety devices to familiarize the miners and their employers with the latest means of conserving the lives of the workers. By efficial statistics it is shown that the death and injury rate in the United States is very much higher in this country than it is abroad in those foreign countries in which mining is carried on extensively. For example, in Beiginm the death rate is baif that in the United States, although the Belgian mines are deeper and more gassy than are ours. The upper picture is that of a government demonstrator showing how gas is pemped from the lungs of a miner overcome at his work. The men in the group are mem bers of a mine rescue crew fitted with oxygen belimets. It is their business to enter a mine after an explosion to bring up the bodies of the dead and reone the imprisoned and injured
