The earliest evidence we have is of 1762, when the Philadelphia postmaster advertised that his "boy" had run away and that patrons must call for their letters at the postoffice The Postai Journal of Hugh Finlay tells us that Boston had no letter carrier in 1773. Of New York he says that "soon after the arrival of a mail the letters are quickly delivered by a runner," which means messenger or letter carrier.
