Sponge Cake For Children. One and a half cupfuls of pastry flour, two tenspoonfuls of baking powder or one teaspoonful of soda and one half teaspoonful of cream of tartar. Add two eggs broken into a cup, then fill up with thin cream and one cupful of sugar. Stir all together in a mixing bowl, flavor with lemon or vanilla. The secret is in the beating, five minutes or more.

Peel the grapefruit and remove the flesh of each section from the tough skin that divides them. Place each portion in a sherbet or a cocktail glass and pour over them the fuice of maraschino cherries or pineapple strup. Garnish with a cherry and serve ice

Concerning Turnips. Turnips are useful in soups. They give the stock a good flavor. Turnips contain a substance which gives the soups in which they are cooked a gelatinous consistency when cold. Yellow turnips ought to be boiled about two hours.


