LABOR AND WAGES

Labor on railroad work in Portland is paid 17 and one-half cents per hour for 10 hours on track work and in the freight yards of the S. P. Co. 17 cents per hour for 10 hours. Conditions in Oregon City are much better. The lowest paid man here receives 20 cents for ten hours and the shift workers receive from \$2.28 to \$2.60 per day for what is termed common labor. This goes to show that Oregon City is the best place in Oregon for everyone, laborer included. We have what other cities do not have—1000 to 1500 jobs 365 days each year and that is enough to make any town. Hundreds of men are now out of employment in Portland and men can be had at almost any rate per day. Oregon City workmen are to be congratulated upon the higher than market rates prevalent here.

Woman Suffrage Recruiting Station In a New York Park



TAKING a leaf from the practice of the regular army, the New York suffragist leaders established "recruiting stations" in the parks, at which women—and men, too—were invited to register for participation in the "votes for women" demonstration of May 4. Wearing natty white costumes, with the distinguishing sash of the movement, the feminine recruiting sergeants took names and addresses when they could get them, made suffrage speeches and offered suffrage literature to the passersby, who often collected in crowds to view the novel sight. It is said that the regulars in charge of the army recruiting stations in the parks were jealous of the attention which the women campaigners attracted, and it is safe to say that the number of enlistments in the service of Uncle Sam was not greatly increased while Miss Columbia, a short distance away, was calling for volunteers in the fight for the ballot.

WILLARD JONES IS PARDONED BY TAFT

only got information concerning the pardon just as he supposed the defense was doing. Burns explained that he had done much of the work of gathering information about possible jurors as this matter was being taken in care of by T. B. Neuhausen, now a real estate agent in Portland, but a right hand man of Heney during the land fraud investigation. In the official records was discovered a code message from Burns to the department at Washington which was considered very damaging. The entire system said to have been used by Heney and Burns in stacking the jury was placed before President Taft, supported by affidavits. According to the evidence, the state was combed and the panel drawn from sections where the sentiment was strong against land fraud operators. By careful selection, the list of prospective jurors was made up of men who politically and otherwise were likely to be prejudiced against the defendants. Jones and Mays were convicted by the same jury. When the President received the evidence he turned it over to the Department of Justice and said he would be governed by the recommendation of the department. It was practically assured months ago that the department would recommend the pardon and the President, himself, appeared favorable, for being a jurist nearly all his life, he is particular about preserving the integrity of the jury system. Had the President not granted the pardon, Senator Borah, of Idaho, is said to have offered to introduce a resolution demanding a Congressional investigation of the methods of Heney and Burns in Oregon. The Jones people did not want such a resolution presented, as it would delay the pardon for several years. Now that the pardon has been granted, however, and Jones will not be incarcerated, it is possible that such a resolution will be offered and an investigation demanded by people unfriendly to Heney.

LEWIS EASILY WINS FROM CLEVER FIGHTER

Jack Lewis, the Oregon City lightweight, who is winning laurels in the padded arena in San Francisco and Oakland has written to a friend in this city as follows: "I, Jack Lewis, fought Bob Wilson, the colored lightweight of Goldfield, Nev., and won in the first round. The fight was last Thursday afternoon. I rushed him and got him a good wallop over the heart, and he threw up his hands, and I swung a left on the chin, and he was asleep for twenty minutes. We entered the ring at 2:45 o'clock, and the fight was over at 2:47 o'clock. I have the same manager, the world's middleweight champion, Stanley Ketchell had, Tommie O'Connor. I have Ketchell's shirt and swing down pat. That's how I won from that coon with that shift, for he was so clever that was the only way I could land. My manager and I are going to leave for Los Angeles in a couple of days to arrange some fights."

THESE are some of the questions which the people of today are asking themselves:

- WHY DO I HAVE TO BE POOR WHEN OTHERS ARE RICH? WHY MUST WE DO THINGS WE HATE TO DO? WHY MUST I BE HAMPERED BY HONESTY AND VERACITY WHEN OTHERS PROFIT BY THEM? WHY MUST ONE BE LOYAL TO A HUSBAND WHEN THERE IS SOME ONE ELSE ONE LIKES BETTER? WHY NOT GET A DIVORCE WHEN BOTH PARTIES TO A MARRIAGE HAVE CEASED TO CARE FOR ONE ANOTHER AND WANT SOME ONE ELSE WHO IS ALSO DISSATISFIED?

The people ask these questions, and they are not satisfied. There is a tendency to apply to their conduct the rule that ANYTHING IS ALL RIGHT IF IT DOES ANOTHER NO HARM. As a result we are getting a code of ethics that does not fill the bill.
