UNION STOCK YARDS, Portland, June 4.—There was a good general run of livestock today, the arrivals over night being 307 cattle, 22 calves, 916 sheep and 188 hogs, and trade during the first half of the day gave evidence of a fair interest on the part of trades in all classes of stock.

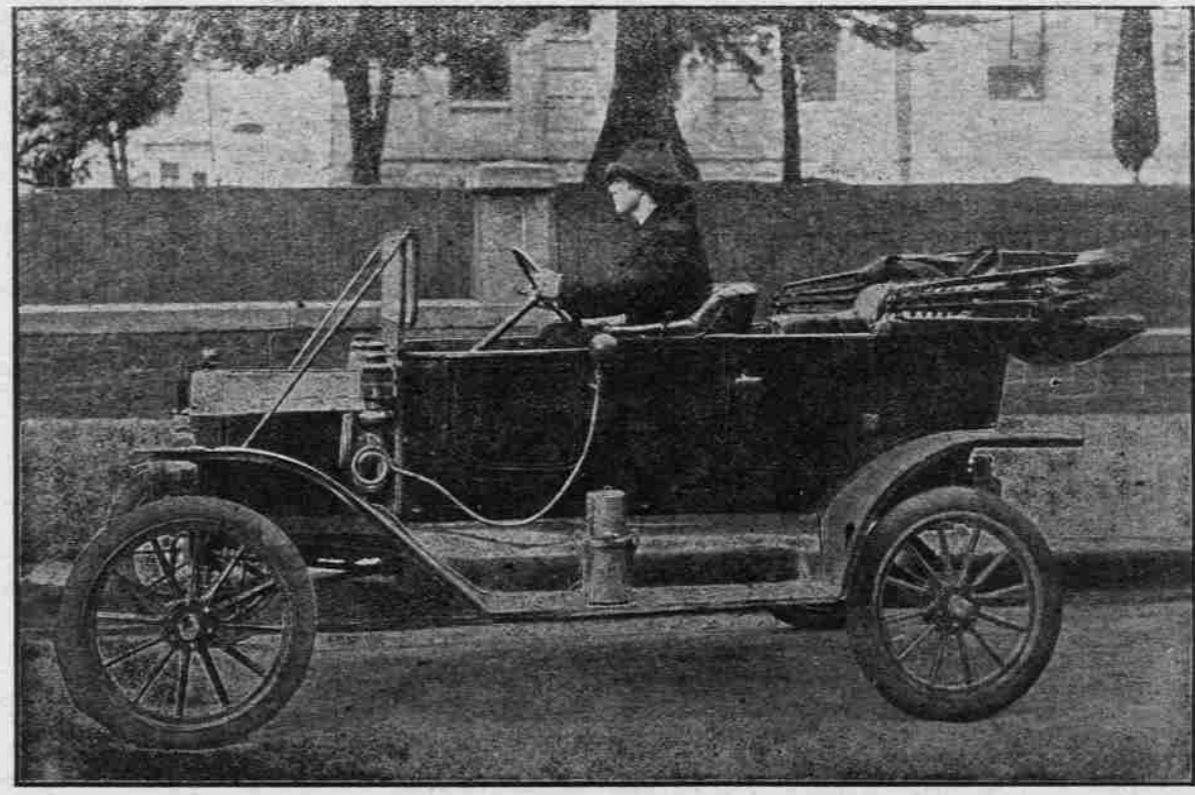
Little Dorothy was having her first experience of riding in a sleeper. She was in a lower berth with her mother, and she asked so many questions that she had to be told to keep quiet.
