Camille Flammarion, the Famous French Astronomer



AMILLE FLAMMARION, the best known of French astronomers, recently celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the publication of his first book, "The Plurality of Inhabited Worlds," written when he was only twenty years old. He is the director of the Juvisy observatory, near Paris, and the accompanying photograph shows him beside his great telescope at the time of the recent eclipse of the sun M. Flammarion has become one of the most talked about astronomers in the world. This is due to his voluminous writings and the fact that he has propounded various fanciful theories of the constitution of the heavenly bodies, besides putting forward extraordinary suggestions for the utilization of natural forces. One of the most remarkable of these suggestions was that for the digging of a huge hole, deeper than any existing mine, which should make it possible to draw upon the internal heat of the earth for running the industries of the world. M.
