OREGON CITY FIRST

We are credited with the largest woolen mills and news print plant west of the Rockies and the third largest news print mills in the world but it may surprise some of our citizens to learn that we have the two fastest running newspaper machines in the world. Machine No. 5 is running 645 feet per minute and machine No. 6 is running 653 feet per minute in the concrete mill of the Willamette Pulp and Paper Company. Another place where not only is Oregon City first but "Oregon City leads the world." The fastest machines in other parts running 630 feet per minute.

FREIGHT DEPOT SITES

The railroads interested in the handling of freight in and out of Oregon City cannot see their way clear to purchase land and erect depots for their own convenience and that of their patrons. Now is the time to get in and get it right. While a railroad has the right of condemnation for depot sites, property a few years hence will be of greater value in Oregon City and what can now be secured at a reasonable price will cost a considerable sum. It would seem the time is now ripe and with proper shipping facilities such a building would soon prove its freight going by water the railroads value. With a public dock and all may change their minds.

Oregon City did its part and more too, toward ridding the river residents and excursionists of the unhealthful and almost unbearable stench from dead eels, which has bothered in years past. If the Willamette River Sanitary Association succeeds in its work, they will find it an easy matter to secure double the amount next year, but the work should be commenced now for the water is beginning to fall and the eels are already being left high and dry.

While the chances of securing an appropriation for a post office from the present Congress are very slim, still it is not policy to let the matter drop. The Live Wires still have the matter in hand, and Congressman

W. C. Hawley is preparing a measure to submit to the next Congress to convene in November next. There is only one way to get anything, and that is to try, then try again, and keep on trying. With such a policy, we'll win in the end.

Another month and Oregon City will have another large, beautifully designed building occupied by a fraternal organization. It is certainly a step toward "the city beautiful" and it is a shame that someone cannot find a way to rid the city of the barns on the river front. With these unsightly buildings off the front there is no more beautiful or desirable property than facing the great Willamette.

The committee in charge of the Fourth of July picnic of the employees of the Willamette Pulp & Paper Co. reports all in readiness for the day of all American days. This is certainly a great undertaking and with 2000 people out of town on a holiday, Oregon City bids fair to be partially deserted. With the program of events as laid out, anyone not having a good time will have himself alone to blame.

LIVESTOCK MARKET SHOWS INACTIVITY

PORTLAND, June 14.—The day was a quiet one in the livestock market. Receipts over night were away below the average of the past few days, the totals being 86 cattle, 5 calves and 175 hogs, and only a few transactions of importance were reported during the first half of the day.

Two small bunches of medium-grade steers changed hands early in the day at \$6 and \$6.25 and some odds and ends in the cow division were disposed of at \$4 to \$6. Better grade beef stuff could undoubtedly have been moved at better figures, and so far as could be ascertained the cattle market on the whole was steady at yesterday's rates.

For the first time since the first of the week, there were no fresh offerings in the mutton division. With no trade in either sheep or lambs passing, values were a matter of some uncertainty, but the market was generally regarded as easy in tone.

For hogs \$7.50 was the best price paid, one load going at that figure. Heavy-weights sold at \$6.75.

Burdick, Salem, 1 car of cattle and calves; The Dalles Dressed Meat Company, The Dalles, 1 car of cattle; W. E. Lowell, Gibson, 1 car of cattle, and B. L. Kidwell, Grangeville, 1 car of cattle.
