It Is Essential That the United States Always Keep Prepared For War

By Major General JOHN F. O'RYAN, Head of the New York National Guard

HE charge of militarism usually made against the regular who preaches preparedness for war will not lie against the national guardsman. Realization of the country's unpreparedness for war accounts for these men's devotion to military service

National guardsmen know wars are not brought about by the hasty anger of potentates or by the overt acts that signal their open declaration, but largely by ECONOMIC OR RACIAL CAUSES OR COMMERCIAL AMBITIONS. The history of the past twelve years shows that war never was more easily resorted to, never more inevitable, despite the widespread talk of peace.

ARBITRATION OF DIFFERENCES WILL PREVENT USE OF THE MAILED FIST UP TO A CERTAIN POINT, BOTH WITH NATIONS AND INDIVIDUALS, BUT IN SUPPORTING A SACRED RIGHT A LIMIT IS INVARIABLY REACHED WHERE ANY MAN OR NATION WILL STRIP FOR FIGHT AND RESORT TO ANY FORCE, EVEN TO MURDER.
