

William Carey Johnson a pioneer of Oregon, died Friday night of heart disease at his home in Portland. He was seventy-eight years old. For halt a century he was prominent in the legal profession, with offices in Oregon City. Later he moved to Portland and was associated for . some time with C. M. Idleman, attorney of that city. Several years ago he retired from active business affairs, but had always taken a lively interest in the work of the courts and was a familiar figure about the corridors and courtrooms of the Multnomah Courthouse, almost to the day of this death. mirably.


