The Railroad Commission, under his act, is vested with regulative jurisdiction over all public utilities in the state, except municipally owned plants. Every public utilities company will be required to furnish adequate and safe service, equipment and facil-Ities and the charges made for any public utility product are required to e reasonable and just and every unjust charge is prohibited and declared to be unlawful.

Provision is made for the compulsory exchange of traffic or products between public utilities and a common user of conduits, subways, street railway tracks, poles, etc., in any street or highway for reasonable com-






