"Blatherskite." "Blatherskite" is an Americanism, or, rather, an old word which has survived chiefly in American usage. The way it came to be popular here is curious. It is really the old Scottish "blatherskite," from "blather," to talk nonsense (old Norse "bladr" non-sense), and "skate," a term of opprobrium. In the song "Maggie Lander," written about 1850, occur the words, "Jog on your gait, ye blatherskite," and this song is a very popular one in the American camp during the war of independence; hence the vogue of the expressive word in its Americanized form.
