"THE ROSE OF PANAMA."

The English version of "The Rose of Panama," a sparkling Viennese operetta that is indeed a worthy successor to "The Merry Widow," "The Chocolate Soldier" and other recent musical successes, will be the attraction at the Heilig Theater Seventh and Taylor Streets, for four nights, beginning Sunday, December 1st, with popular price matinee on Wednesday under the management of John Cort.

Heinrich Berte is responsible for the score of this most entrancing of European musical importations, and those familiar with the works of the celebrated composer require little further endorsement as to the merits of the opera. But a young cad learns the truth and at a critical moment tells the husband, putting the worst possible face upon the story and arousing the wildest anger and jealousy. It is a powerful acting play, with big scenes and thrilling climaxes, and the Baker players will do full justice to it. Of course in the end everything is made right, by a series of happy circumstances.
