

Dr. J. W. Norris, city health offi-Golden Spike Day" next Tuesday, in cer, is authority for the statement that there are 55 cases of typhoid fever in the city, and there may be at least 20 more. Dr. Calvin S. White, State Health Officer, says he is virtually certain that the water supply is responsible for the epidemic. a statement to the Morning Enter-

"In the analysis of the water from the reservoir of Oregon City we found colon bacilli, and we found colon bacilli in water from downtown dis-trict. Finding colon bacilli means contamination by sewage. The epidemic in Oregon City is, in all like-lihood, due to an infected water supply. There is never an extensive outbreak of typhoid fever in a community un-

less the water is to blame." Dr. Allen J. McLaughlin, of the United States Public Health Service, in an address delivered at a meeting of life insurance presidents in New York, Friday, declared that the ravages of typhoid fever in this country are worse than the plague in India or the cholera in Russia. He said that the economic loss caused by typhoid fever in this country is \$100,000,000 a year. The insurance companies will do everything they can to put an end to typhoid.
