BLISSFUL Benjamin De Casseres IGNORANCE is the author of an article in the St. Louis Mirror, which is being commented upon widely. The sophistry will be apparent to the average thinker, and most of us will recognize an attempt to out do Bernard Shaw. Nevertheless, the article in question is brilliant to a degree, and is especially interesting as showing how plausible an argument may be built up on inverted facts. He maintains that the price of knowledge is disillusionment, which of course is partly true, but he goes on to argue that education and sophistication often lead to unhappiness, imperfection and anarchy, and draws the absolute conclusion that "Curiosity, which is a sword in the hands of the hardy, is ultimately a destructive force to the race at large." This of course is nothing else but Von Hartman's "The Philosophy of the Unconscious."

Naturally enough, Mr. Casseres maintains that credulity and ignorance are the real bases of civilization, "progress" and happiness. "Ignorance', he says, "is beneficial. Ignorance makes life possible. Our veils make us happy; our seals bar out the winds of doubt." He goes on to argue:
