The majority of votes decided a question, and the order in which the senators spoke Oregon City. and voted was determined by their rank. Their decisions, called senatus last week. consulta, were the supreme law of the republic, from which, of course, there was no appeal. After the establishment of the empire the character of the senate was greatly lowered, and at last it became simply the tool of the emperor, to do his bidding regardless of the consequences .- New York American


