The bill passed in 1911 provides that in counties with populations of 10,000 or more the two county papers having the largest circulations shall publish the delinquent tax lists, the maximum cost not to exceed the fixed rate for legal notices. It was not until all phases of the subject had been carefully considered that the bill was passed by the Legislature, and, inasmuch as its operation has been of benefit to the county and many taxpayers as well, it is not conceivable that the present Legislature will give the measure its death blow. The cost of publication is borne by the property advertised.


