Schuebel Would Assess Water Rights

Representative Schuebel has introduced the following bill: By Representative Schuebel—A bill for an act to provide for the assessment of appropriated water powers and of public service corporation franchises.

Section 1. That all water powers claimed or appropriated in Oregon, and all improvements connected therewith and belonging thereto, shall be assessed by the county assessor in the county where the same are situated.

Section 2. Every franchise of a public service corporation operated in more than one county shall be assessed and listed for taxation by the Board of State Tax Commissioners, separately and apart from the assessed value of the property of the corporation.

Section 3. Every person, firm, corporation or association claiming or appropriating any water for power purposes shall report on or before March 1st in each year, to the county assessor of the county in which the same is claimed or appropriated.

Section 4. The county assessor is hereby authorized to employ expert assistants to examine the books of account, and to compute the horsepower claimed or appropriated.

Section 5. If any claimant or appropriator of water for power shall fail or refuse to comply with any provision of this act, upon conviction thereof he shall be fined by a fine of not less than fifty dollars nor more than two hundred dollars for every such offense.

Section 6. The name "public service corporation" within the meaning of this act, includes every person or corporation having a franchise from the state or any municipality, to serve the public, or which in fact serves the public, as a quasi public corporation.

Section 7. No public service corporation owns or shall own vested property rights in its franchise, but all its corporate rights, franchises, duties and privileges as a trustee for the people of Oregon and for the people of every county and municipality in which it operates or by which it is granted or allowed by any corporate powers, rights, privileges, permits, licenses or franchises.

Section 8. All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

under his present time of employment he stated that he naturally would prefer an eight hour day should the compensation be the same.

"If a secret ballot were to be taken at the mill" asked Senator Dimick, "what would you consider the result would be?"

"Then you have changed your mind since two years ago, when you supported the bill," interposed Dimick.

"Yes, a wise man sometimes changes his mind, but a fool never does," was the quick reply.

A. S. Fuller, employed at the mills, gave the same expression as to the hours and wages.

George Pusey, superintendent of the Hawley Pulp & Paper Company, and Secretary Osmund, of the same mill, were called upon to explain the so-called 18-hour shift which is used on Sundays.

Members of the committee attacked the 18-hour shift, declaring that this shift should be stopped or there will be some legislation passed which will require it to be stopped.

It is not certain just what report will be made on the bill. The speaker from Oregon City tonight, including the employees in the mills, were loudly applauded at intervals and frequently the applause was so prolonged and loud that the chairman was compelled to call for order that the hearing might continue.
