CLUB WHEAT SELLING AT EIGHTY-FIVE

Eighty-five cents was freely offered for club wheat in the country, basis tidewater track delivery, during the last 24 hours, but there were no sellers. Country interests are not now interested in the market beyond asking a price. They will not even tell what they want for their supplies.

With March nearby and tax date almost at hand, there is likely to be more business available within the immediate future.

Some small business is passing in oats for March delivery, with bids at \$26.50 to \$27.00 a ton, while as high as \$23.50 is being offered in a very limited way for spot and March barley. As a rule, dealers are quoting the barley market stagnant.

Market for grain bags, while steady, is very quiet for the moment. No change in prices.

END OF CRIMINAL PROGENY, BILL'S AIM

SALEM, Or., Feb. 12.—With just 16 votes, the number needed for passage, the Lewelling bill for sterilization of habitual criminals, moral degenerates and perverts went to victory in the Senate this morning.

Dr. Owens Adair of Astoria, who originated the bill, and has lobbied for it succeeding sessions of the Legislature, was a witness to its final passage, and he has been invited by Governor West to be present in his office when it is signed.

Senator Day, who first voted against the bill, changed defeat into victory by changing his vote at the end of the roll call. While reconsideration may be moved on the day after a bill has passed, there is believed to be little prospect of reconsideration in this case, as three Senators were absent today and one or more of these are believed to favor the measure.

Joseph supported the bill, and Wood, who has before opposed such legislation, said he believed the present bill does not have the defects of its predecessors. President Malarkey declared against it, because, he said,

it doesn't do the things it is supposed to do and doesn't deal with the insane, through whom the laws of heredity may transmit insanity to their progeny. The vote on the bill was as follows:

Ayes—Burgess, Day, Dimick, Farrell, Hawley, Hollis, Joseph, Kiddle, Lester, McCulloch, Perkins, Ragsdale, Smith of Coos, Smith of Josephine, Stewart and Wood—16.

Noes—Barrett, Bean, Butler, Carlson, Kellaher, Miller, Moser, Neuner, Patton, President Malarkey—11.

Absent—Hoskins, Thompson Von der Hellen—2.

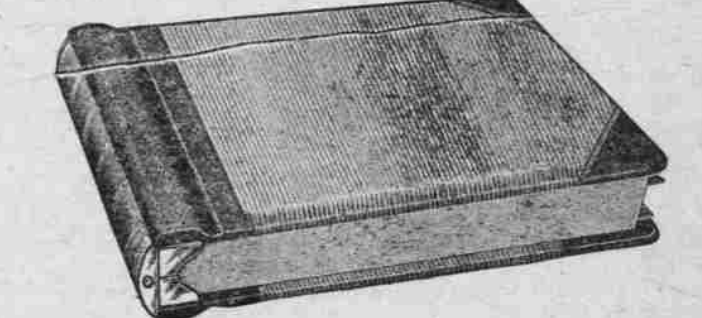

tage from \$1.10 a day to \$1.25 a day and the girls will go back tomorrow with the assurance that the coveted raise will be given them the first of March.

Improved sanitary conditions in the mill, which were demanded by the 38 girls who went on strike, are also promised by the company as soon as the new bag mill is completed—which the management hopes will be in a short time. It is hoped that the absence of ventilation, the dampness, the foul smells and the clouds of paper dust which the girls complained of and which resulted, they say,

in tuberculosis and other diseases, will be corrected when the new mill is completed.
