limit them. It is part of the great web of social life, and that is why it is valuable.

Every day of the year every newspaper prints news, opinions and appeals of which many men related to it in the business world disapprove.

IT IS THE READERS THAT COUNT, AND, AFTER ALL, A NEWS-PAPER IS WHAT ITS READERS MAKE IT. IT IS THE KIND OF NEWSPAPER IT IS BECAUSE THAT IS THE KIND THE PEOPLE WHO BUY IT LIKE.

The newspaper account is FAR more accurate than the average word that passes from mouth to mouth among men. In the main, the newspaper is far more truthful than the community it represents, and as for rightenueses the newspaper is BETTER THAN THE AV-ERACE OF ITS COMMUNITY.




