BLIGHT KEEPS DOWN PRICE OF POTATOES

A. L. Beatie, of the Oregon Commission Company, says that the low pices of potatoes that now prevails in Oregon, is partially due to the fact that the potatoes from all parts of the state are badly affected with blight. For this reason, he states, " the farmers in California and other states are afraid to buy them for planting. He says that if the farmers are not careful next year to dip all their potatoes which they use for planting, the entire crop will again be affected with the blight and the price of that commedity will be low I again next year.
