SUGAR JOINS DULL CHEAPER STAPLES

With the canning season yet far away, and with housewives not particularly interested in charges in price of such commodities as sugar, the announcement Friday that a reduction of 29 cents a hundred pounds had been ordered by Pacific refiners as a result of tariff changes created but little interest in local circles. However, wholesale sugar is cheaper, and quite likely the drop will be reflected in a change in retail prices,

Other market commodities remained Friday about as earlier in the week. The supply of greens continues ample, and potatoes are not reviving much in price. Selected tubers bring from 50 to 90 cents a sack, but the market is sluggish.

Strawberries are getting more plen tiful, and the price has fallen to the 26th, 1913.
