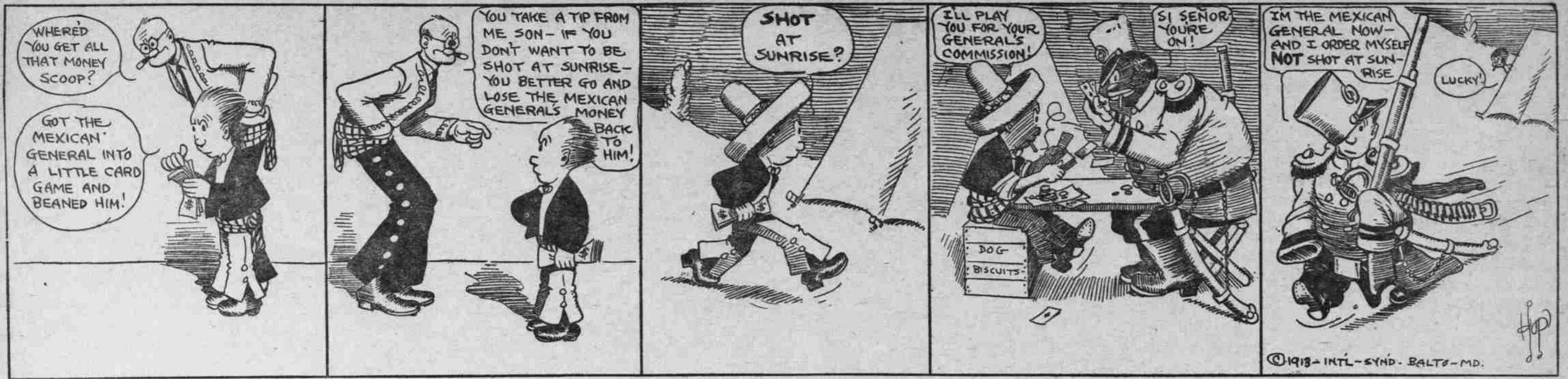

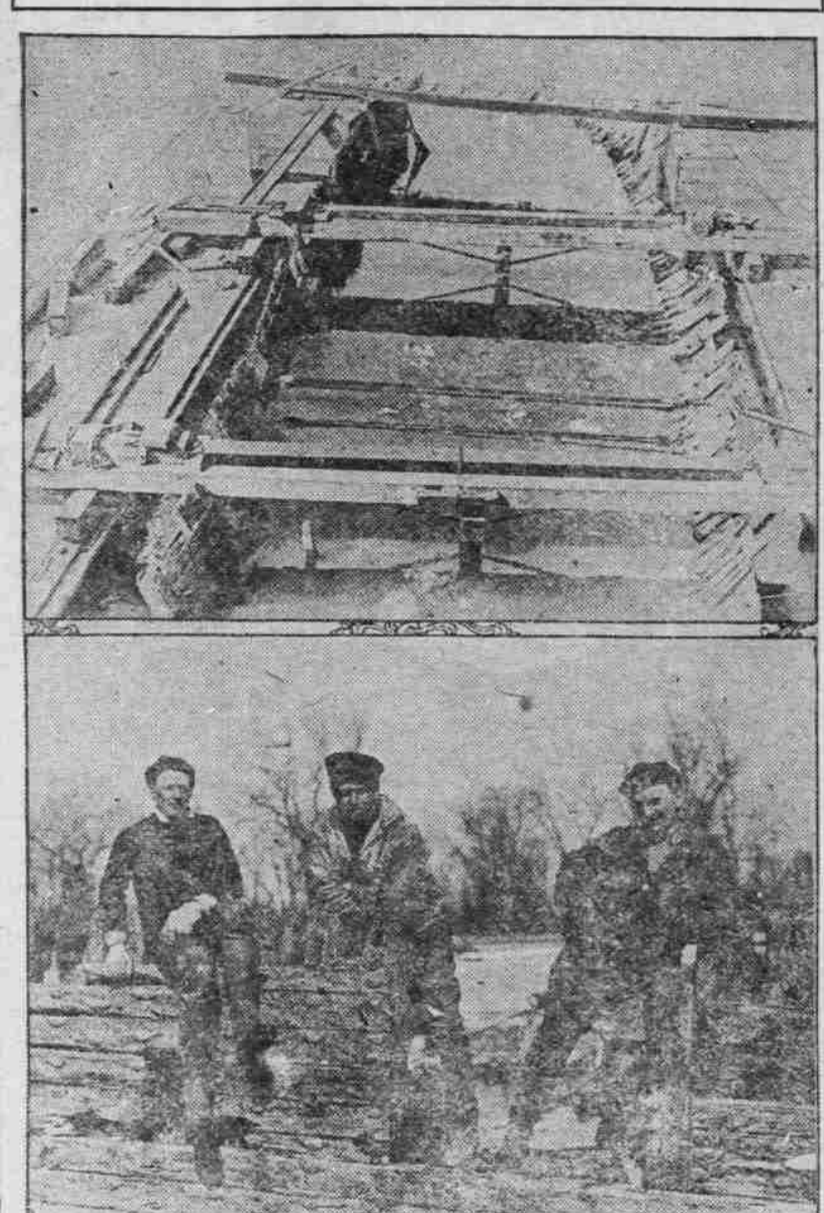

Perry's Old Flagship Niagara Resurrected From Lake Erie

Perry's flagship, the Niagara, is being raised from the waters of Milsary bay, Erie harbor, where it has rested since the battle of Lake Erie, Sept. 10, 1813. The upper picture shows the Niagara from stern to bow, taken from a crane thirty feet above the stern end of the boat. The lower picture shows three of the men who helped raise her. The opening, wherein one of the men is standing, is one of the gun ports. The boat was raised six feet above the water line by the use of pontoons and was then beached. She will be rebuilt. The historic old warship was covered with a housing as soon as beached.
