An over supply of rhubarb, and the fact that the lucious stems can no longer be canned, owing to the passage of a federal law against such handling of the plant, has forced prices of this favorite sauce fruit down to in the neighborhood of 3 cents a pound. There is more rhubarb and less demand for it then ever before in the local market, With the advent of warm weather
