

Just what additional measures may be necessary to exclude undesirable immigrants now coming to the United States within the law it is not for me to say.

But certain undesirables are coming whom the authorities cannot exclude lawfully. Aliens have no inherent right to enter the country, and it is OUR OWN FAULT IF WE CONTINUE TO AD-MIT THOSE OF INFERIOR TYPE OR WHO ARE NO GAIN TO THE UNITED STATES.

We should unquestionably be MORE PARTICULAR than we are as to whom we receive and strive for quality rather than quantity. We require only immigrants of the right sort, those who are physically strong and who possess such moral and other qualities as will help build up the race and the nation.

WE ARE NOT CALLED UPON TO ENDANGER THE FUTURE OF OUR COUNTRY OR ITS INSTITUTIONS FOR THE SAKE OF THE DISTRESSED OF OTHER COUNTRIES, HOWEVER MUCH THEIR CON-DITION MAY AROUSE OUR SYMPATHY.
