

# SUMMER FRUITS

With the sudden onrush of summer eather strawberries have been coming into the local and Portland markets with much greater freedom, and as a result the price has dropped in some grades as far as one dollar a crate. Prime Oregon and Washington berries are still topping the market, but the bottom has dropped out of California prices. State berries are the best of the offerings, and are finding ready sales.

Summer fruits are also being shipped in from outside states. Florida watermelons have appeared at five cents per pound, and many were sold at that figue. Early cantaloupes are also being offered at top prices, again sta but the fruit does not seem greatly in any price. demand, doubt being expressed as to its flavor. Apricots are coming in from California in increasing quantities, and the price has dropped to \$2.25 a crate. Advices have been received that early Yakima peaches will be on the market by the end of

Asparagus is still a prime market favorite, and is ranging from 65 cents to a dollar per dozen bunches. Local market prices are somewhat under this, growers being able to sell direct for less than the commission men are
