WAGE ARBITRATION.

The experience arising from large wage controversies places a serious responsibility upon those whose duty it is to enact proper legislation governing the relations between employer and employee, to consider whether the Erdman act should not be amended to increase the number of arbitrators and thereby constituté a board of sufficient size to properly represent the public as well as the parties to the controversy and to direct the necessary farrenching investigations and fully share the responsibility of an impartial determination of the equitable and economic ques tions arising from such disputes It will also be found necessary to provide a longer time than thirty days specified in the act for the consideration of the subject and the rendering of a de cision. It may not be possible to prevent strikes or lockouts by requiring compulsory arbitration. but it is wise to consider wheth er an obligation should not be placed upon the employer and employee to advise the authoritles of the questions at Issue before any lockouts or strikes can become effective, so that by due publication and inquiry the government and the public may be fully informed of the extent of

the controversy and its causes .-
