Love With Health Will Make For Happier Marriages

By Surgeon General RUPERT BLUE of the United States Health Service

THE health marriage idea presents a public health question which cannot be left entirely to the consideration of physicians, nor is it

merely a question for ministers. It is a great SOCIAL PROB-LEM OF VITAL INTEREST TO EVERY MEMBER OF SOCIETY and is based on the development of a better American citizenship and a nation of healthier people through the protection of women and men and their offspring against insidious diseases, the existence of which should

be given careful thought by every person contemplating marriage. It would be an extremely good thing if every state would hasten the day when statutes will be adopted which make necessary the PRESEN-TATION OF HEALTH CERTIFICATES BEFORE MARRIAGE. That these laws should be easy of enforcement, they should not, in my opinion, be too drastic. Both parties planning marriage should have knowledge whether either is diseased, however, and the provision for a health certificate before marriage is the only method of making sure that they will get this knowledge.

As most normal people look forward to entering the married state, I believe that the placing of marriage on a health basis WHLL MAKE ALL PEOPLE THINK MORE OF THE CARE OF THEIR BODIES The Union. -make them more anxious to ward off diseases-and that the general enactment of legislation of this kind will mark one of the longest steps which have ever been made in the encouragement of preventive medicinc.






