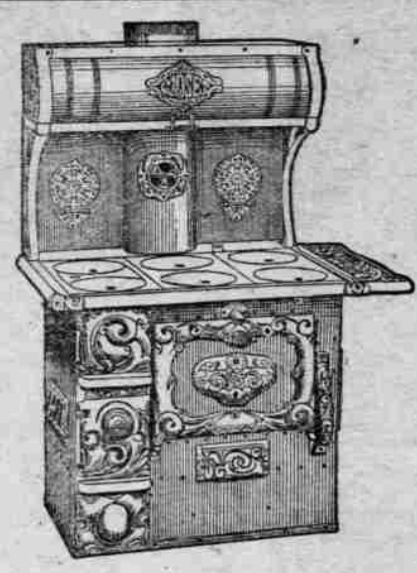

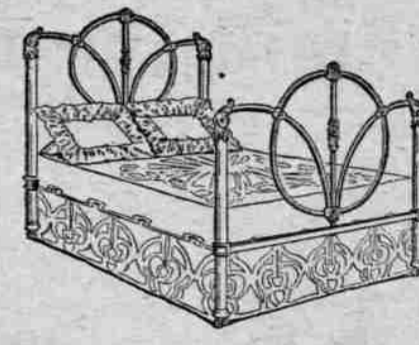

APPLES LEGITIMATE CROP FOR VALLEY

"Apples in the Willamette Valley have been grown largely as a side line, and as a diversified crop, and in many years they have not proved very satisfactory," said Professor C. I. Lewis of the Oregon Agricultural College in addressing the Sate Horticulture society.
"This is due in many cases to a lack of proper methods of culture and to the choice of the wrong varieties.

THREE WARS' CELEBRATION

Vote on Amendments

AUSTIN, Texas, July 18.—At a general election tomorrow several proposed amendments to the Constitution of Texas will be submitted to the voters of the state for their adoption or rejection.
