# PARDON SOUGHT

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., July 25 .-Actors and oter members of the theatrical profession throughout America are to be asked to sign a petition for the pardon of George Marion, an oldtime actor, who is serving a life term in the Eastern Penitentiary here for the murder of his wife four years ago in Wilkes Barre. Clemency is to be asked on the ground that Marion is dying of tuberculosis.

WILKES BARRE, Pa., July 25.— The murder committed by George Marion, for whom a pardon is being sought by members of the theatrical profession occurred in this city Aug. 10, 1909. In early life Marion had been an actor and in later years was employed as a theatrical advance agent. He had lived in Wilkes Barre, but at the time of the tragedy his home was in Atlanta, Ga,


