

# A SINGULAR DUEL

I was attending a vaudeville show one evening in a small town in Nevada wherein a part of the performance was knife throwing. He said that it was the old story of a man turned down by a girl and marrying his rival. At the same time Weatherill apologized for his wife's ever having been not taking sight as with a weapon.
