Cost Most American Cities but Give Are Least Failures In Return By Professor Alderman of CHARLES E. Chicago MERRIAM.

N AMERICAN CITIES THE FAILURE OF THE GOVERNMENT TO KEEP PACE WITH THE CHANGES GOING ON AROUND US HAS LED TO DISASTROUS RESULTS. THE GOVERNMENT OF OUR CITIES IN GENERAL IS NEITHER AS EFFICIENT, AS ECONOMICAL NOR AS POPULAR AS IS DESIRABLE AND POSSIBLE. IT IS GEN-ERALLY RECOGNIZED THAT THE GOVERNMENT OF OUR CITIES IS THE MOST EXPENSIVE AND LEAST EFFICIENT IN THE WORLD. WE PAY MORE AND RECEIVE LESS THAN THE CITIES OF OTHER COUNTRIES

Inefficient government might be tolerated if it represented the people. But most cities during the last generation have been governed by a combination of POLITICAL MACHINES AND SPECIAL IN-TERESTS.

The political boss and the public service corporation have been the chief factors in our municipal system. They have endeavored to dominate both political parties and to reduce all elections to a friendly contest BETWEEN TWO SETS OF THEIR OWN PUPPETS. These interests have been themselves entirely nonpartisan, though they have worked in and through political parties and have used party names, party symbols and party principles as a CLOAK FOR THEIR OWN PROJECTS.

They hide behind Lincoln and Roosevelt or Jefferson and Jackson as prudence indicates. They have relied upon the division of honest citizens into opposing political camps, while they themselves have or-ganized and combined with entire disregard of party line or party distinction.

OUTRIGHT GRAFT AND THEFT ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR MUCH OF THE LOSS THAT FALLS UPON THE TAXPAYER. THE EX-ISTENCE OF THE SPOILS SYSTEM IS ENORMOUSLY EXPENSIVE AND WASTEFUL.

The general atmosphere of politics surrounding the average city hall is not favorable to the adoption of systematic and orderly business methods. We cannot expect to secure a proper system of street cleaning if every laborer and team has to be selected because of Republican or Democratic affiliations. Repeated investigations of the expenditures of city governments have revealed FRAUD, FAVORITISM AND IN-EFFICIENCY ON A TREMENDOUS SCALE.




