MRS. CHASE TO ASK FOR INJUNCTION

The injunction suit of Mrs. S. A. Chase against Oregon City asking for an order of the circuit court restraining the council from constructing the elevator at Seventh street will probably be filed in court Tuesday.

J. E. Hedges, as attorney for the complainant, plans to bring the action to a head at once and to ask the court for an order that will prevent the council's construction of the elevator and the overhead crossing to the bluff.

The fighting of this case through the court will at least tie up the construction for several weeks and will prevent the city from going ahead with its work until after the action is finally determined by the courts.
