## GAME PLAYED IN RAIN

OREGON CITY LOOSES COUNTY HONORS TO ESTACADA

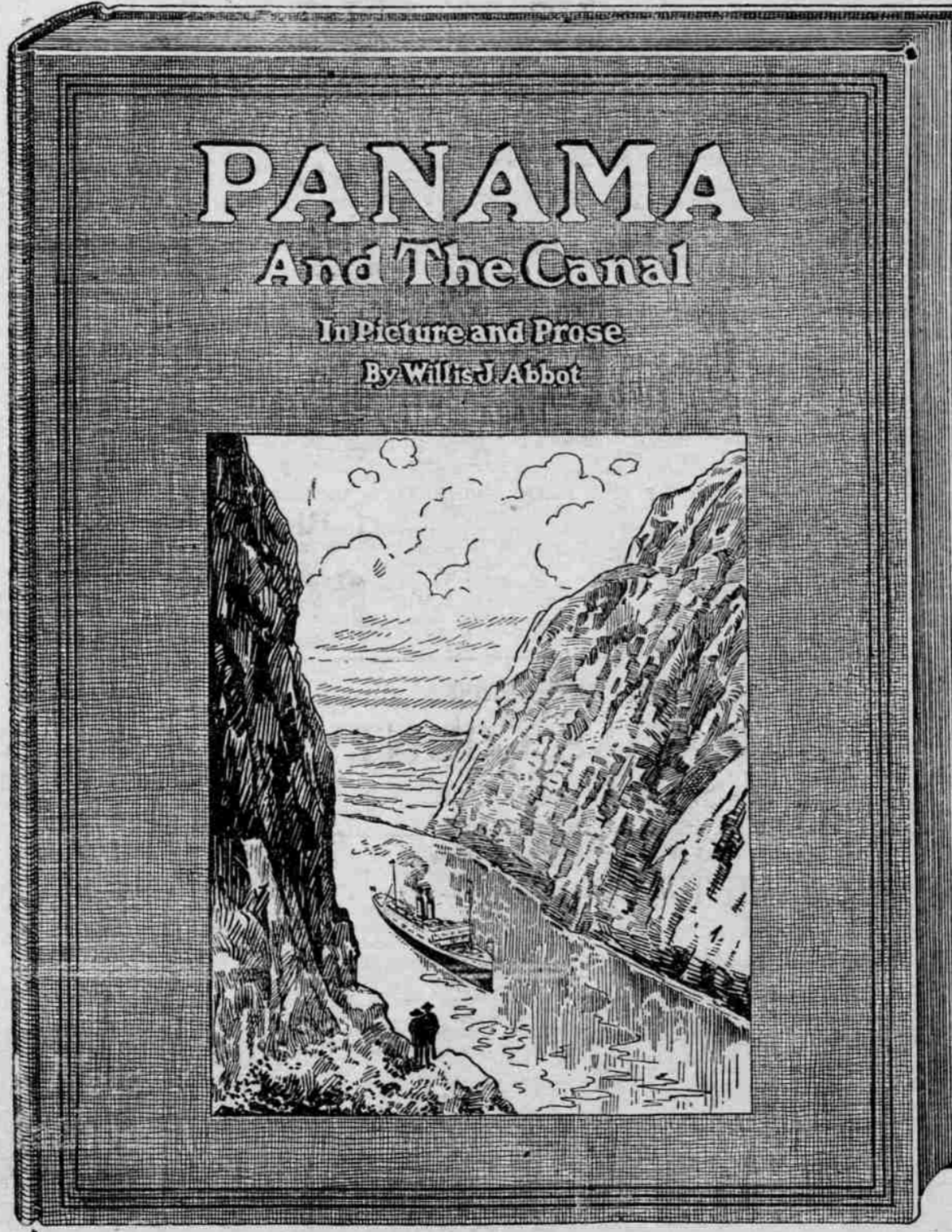
