Lenox, Mass., Sept. 3 .- Witliam Craig, the secret service operator, who was killed, was 48 years of age, weighing over 200 pounds, and was more than 6 feet tall. He was a former member of the Queen's Grenadiers and was an expert broadswoardsman. Years ago he gave exhibitions with Duncan Ross and was credited with many victories over him. Craig caught and arrested a crank at Montpelier who was attempting to reach the president on his trip.

New York, Sept. 2.—Henry Hunter, the negro who shot a number of policemen and set fire to his house in Queens Borough, last night, in an effort to escape arrest, was captured early today and locked up in the Astoria jail. In the fight between Hunter and those who tried to arrest him, 11 policemen, three citizens and Hunter's wife were wounded.
