Two Hundred People Are Homeless and Fifteen Persons Have Lost Their Lives-Whole Families Have Perished.

Vancouver, Wash., Sept. 15 .-The great forest fires of Clark county are on the wane, but the ruin in their wake is terrible. Upwards of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, days 11 hours and 57 minutes, 200 people are homeless and not less than fifteen persons have lost their lives and the bodies have been seared and charred in the devastating ocean of flame that for the astating ocean of flame that for the brought in.
