

THE CHAMPIONSHIP

COMMENTS THAT NEWSPAPERS MAKE ABOUT GAMES AND OUTLOOK.

Editors Play More Strenuous Ball Than do the Sturdy Men Who Figure in the Game.

Eugene dispatch in Portland Telegram: The result of Saturday's game does not show the strength of either OAC or U of O elevens, as on such a field two teams might play a tie when there is great difference in their strength. However, the U of O has no excuse and has the best of feeling for OAC. "They treated us like friends," said a member of the University team, "and the gap which heretofore separated the two institutions has been bridged and we hope to renew our athletic relations with the Oregon Agricultural College."

Albany dispatch in Portland Telegram: The three teams yet eligible for the collegiate championship of the state for this season are the University of Oregon, Oregon Agricultural College and Albany College. Both Albany and OAC have played a scoreless game with U of O. From this fact it may seem that if the U of O wins Saturday's game, Albany will be eliminated from the championship race, while Corvallis will still remain a factor in the contest, but on the other hand, if Albany wins the game next Saturday it will give the local institution the collegiate championship of Oregon for the season of 1922. The Corvallis team has refused to play both the Linu county Collegians or to play a return game with the U of O, so that next Saturday's game will probably settle the championship of the state unless a draw should result.

Eugene Register: The tie game played last Saturday in Corvallis between the O A C and U of O served to complicate the football situation in Oregon, and as the Corvallis team has absolutely refused to play Albany or Eugene, again, the superiority of the different teams cannot be settled. It is very probable though that Herbold and his team will butt in at the close of the season and claim the championship.

Albany Herald: The football team of the Oregon Agricultural College has flatly refused to meet the Albany College eleven at any date, and all negotiations with that team are ended. Manager Thomson made the Farmers several propositions but they flatly refused to consider any proposition. The state collegiate championship is between Albany College, OAC and U of O. Eugene has played both the other teams draw games. Coach Edwards of Albany College, while not of a boastful nature, says that he believes Albany can easily defeat the OAC on any kind of a ground, and he is not afraid of U of O defeating the home eleven. The championship is in quite a muddle, caused by the apparent fear of the OAC to play Albany.

Albany Herald: Manager Thomson of the Albany College team, late last evening arranged a game with the University of Oregon team to be played in this city on Saturday afternoon, November 15. This game will decide the championship of Oregon and will probably be the best exhibition of football ever witnessed in this city. The Albany team is in the very best condition and will practice every evening this week. The University eleven will have fully recovered from their game with OAC, and will go in determined to win. The outcome will be a problem until the game is ended as football experts are of the opinion that both teams are very evenly matched.

NO SESSION

GOVERNOR ANNOUNCES THAT HE WILL NOT CONVENE THE LEGISLATURE.

Saos the Purposes for Which a Special Session was Required Should be Well Served by Regular Session-Other News.

Salem, Or Nov 11—Governor Geer today announced his decision not to call a special session of the legislature, saying in substance that no "extraordinary occasion" exists. In making the announcement the governor issued the following statement:—

"When the governor of a state has been asked to call an extra session of the legislature and decides to deny the request, it is but fair that he should inform the public of his reasons although it is not particularly his duty. I have been requested by the Taxpayers' League and the officials of the city of Portland, as well as some other citizens to convene the legislature in extraordinary session for reasons some of which are purely local to the city of Portland, and for others, which if valid, would be important to the state at large. Four reasons have been urged for calling a special session of the legislature. To wit: To provide state assistance for the Lewis & Clark Fair, to enact a law providing specific salaries for state officers, to formally pass the city charter of Portland, which was adopted by the people of that city last June, and to make provision for the enforcement of the initiative and referendum amendment to the state constitution."

Washington, Nov 11—Oxnard is here already fighting Cuban reciprocity. He and other beet sugar advocates recognize that in a treaty with Cuba sugar is likely to be given 30 per cent, instead of the 20 per cent carried in the bill, which failed at the last session. As this treaty does not have to go to the house, it will require simply two-thirds of the senate to put it through. If the friends of Cuban reciprocity insist upon action, they can keep the treaty before the senate to the exclusion of all other business, and so pass it in spite of the opposition that may be engaged.

The Oxnard interests have begun their campaign early, as they did before the last session, but they are not so arrogant as they were a year ago.

Savanah, Ga Nov 11—Hypnotism has been employed in the case of an ex-convict named Miller, a negro, who confessed to the murder of Gugie Bourguin and his colored servant, to make him reveal the facts.

Miller alleged he was hired by a white man to kill Bourguin. His confession was regarded as a fabrication, and he was put under hypnotic influence in order to prove or disprove his story.

Miller, in his trance, said he did fire the shots that killed Bourguin but that he heard them, and knew who fired them. He was put into a buggy with two officers and made go through what he alleges to have been his confession with the tragedy. Still in a trance he drove into the court and pointed out the exact location where he asserts that the shooting was done. Miller described minutely four men, who according to his story murdered Bourguin. Miller is illiterate, being able neither to read or write.
