GOVERNOK ELECT CHAMBERLAIN HAS MANY APPLICATIONS FOR PLACES.

But the Loaves Are Few-Men who Want to Be Superintendent of the Penitentiary-Also Private Secretary-Also State Land Agent.

Portland Oregonian: time is fast approaching when Ceorge E. Chamberlain, as governor of the state of Oregon, will hand out a number of appointments to loyal democrats who have shown themselves in public or private life to be worthy of public trust. Not all who are worthy will receive appointments, for the number of places to be filled by the governor is exceedingly small. Nor will all the loyal be rewarded, for as it is well known, the democrats were all Chamberlain democrats, both before and after the convention. In this respect the new governor will have an advantage, for no man can claim credit for having been the decided factor in securing the nomi-nation for Mr. Chamberlain. It was a nomination which no other democrat wanted, for probably no other democrat could have been elected. Since all were loyal Chamberlain men, the new governor has only the duty of selecting his appointees from among the list of candidates, having regard for their fitness for the office.

The truth is that more can be learned about what the governor is likely to do by listening to the talk of democratic politicians than by talking with Mr. Chamberlain himself.

If the governor knows, he won't tell. Ever since the June election the superintendency of the penitentiary has been a subject of considerable speculation. The position pays ony \$1500 a year, but as the superintendent is also provided house rent, provisions and fuel, the place is more desirable than would at first appear. It is at least attractive enough to bring out half a dozen candidates. Frank Durbin and W H Downing, both of Marion counment of a considerable majority of exception. the democrats of the county leads many to think that neither will succeed in his ambition. Some of Mr. Chamberlain's friends, it is said, are advising him that if the democrats up in Marion cannot agree upon one of the candidates he should not be expected to make a selection as between the two. Both are generally conceded to be competent men for the place, but if the governor finds a competent man where there is no local fight on he may think best to leave the Marion county men to fight it out. If an agreement could be reached up in Marion that county would very likely get the superintendency (and may anyway), for Marion was one of the banner counties in the democratic victory. Among other candidates for the head office of the penitentiary are: T. G. Hailey, of Pendleton, who has the backing of another of the banner democratic counties; J. A. Douthit, editor of the Times-Mountaineer, of The Dalles, and George R. Hammers-ley, of Gold Hill, who claims the support of the Southern Oregon contingent. If Marion county does not get the appointment, the prevailing opinion seems to be that the next strongest candidates are Hailey and Douthit. It is said that Yambill county also has a candi-

The Governor also has the exclusive voice in the appointment of the Adjutant-General, who draws a salary of \$125 a month. Among the candidates for this position in present incumbent, C. U. Ganten-Philippines who would like the appointment, but no one in the local democracy seemed to know his name. Some veteran in the Spanish-American War ought to be able to get a strong indersement for the position.

Chicago, Dec. 16.—Judge Elbert Gary chairman of the United States Steel Corporation, announced today the purchase of the Union and Sharon plants of the Union Steel Company, near Pittsburg, the transaction involved a bond issue

Judge Gray gave out a statement embodying the details of the trans-action, in which he states that the properties purchased have wire, nail and other works in operation as going properties, and that when fully completed they will have five more blast furnaces with a capacity to manufacture 7500 kegs of nails daily and new and modern tube mills, bar mills, tin mills, sheet mille, plate mills, etc. They also have about 5000 acres of cooking coal in the Connellsville region, besides terminal roads in the coke region, 6200 acres of fuel coal on the Monongahela River, limestone properties and valuable developed ore mines in the Mesaba region and Marquette region, containing about 40,000,000 tons of ore, two lake steamers and steel railroad cars'
