Death occurred at San Francisco, last Sunday, after an illness of but a few days. The malady was ap-\$ 91999 02 pendicitis, which finally developed into peritonitis. The disease first appeared in violent form on Thursday of last week, at Calistoga. The necessity of a surgical operation appeared, and the patient was at once taken to San Francisco, where Friday afternoon, in Lane hospital an operation was performed. three eminent physicians taking part in the work.

The sufferer survived the operation, for a time, but later the symptoms became more and more alarming, and Sunday the end came. At the bedside were Miss Abbie Wright, a sister, the wife and Joseph Wright. The body was tak-en at once to Calistoga, where the funeral was held, after which the remains were brought to Corvallis for burial in the family lot.




