

IN THE WHIRLPOOL.

MAN GOES SAFELY THROUGH RAPIDS OF NIAGARA.

"Jack" Glenister swam the Whirlpool Rapids the hitherto unaccomplished feat—Once Prevailed by Police—Other News.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Aug. 20.—"Jack" Glenister swam the Whirlpool rapids this morning, according to his own statement and that of his friends, who say they witnessed the hitherto unaccomplished feat.

Without the aid of a life-preserver or cork vest, it is asserted that Glenister, who was prevented from making the attempted swim on Sunday by the police, eluded the officials shortly after dawn this morning, and with strong, powerful strokes breast the current down which the unfortunate Webb went to death.

If Glenister has accomplished this feat he is entitled to honors which it has been believed could not possibly fall to man. The visitor to the falls knows with what velocity the waters of the Niagara river whirl about at the apex of the famous Whirlpool. The ordinary man fails to comprehend how a human being could fail to enter the swirling, seething, swirling current and live. Like a maelstrom it clutches and drags down anything that is cast upon its surface.

Glenister says he made his way this morning and emerged more dead than alive, to be picked up by friends and carried to the Angler's Retreat, at Lewiston where he was revived. At noon he appeared at the falls, apparently in a dazed condition, while his friends, who assert that they witnessed the performance, loudly sang his praise and emblazoned his fame to the world.

Glenister announced on Sunday, when the police prevented his attempt to swim the rapids, that he would accomplish the feat within sixty days. He reached Lewiston last night, with his mind fully made up to attempt the feat, whether the issue was death or life with fame and fortune. Only the few friends who accompanied him were admitted to the secret.

It was 3 o'clock this morning when Glenister and his friends walked up the gorge road from Lewiston to the old Maid of the Mist landing, where final preparations were made for the attempt. Glenister wore swimming trunks. He was in superb condition, and his friends say there was not the slightest nervousness about him as he walked.

As the darkness gave way to dawn Glenister pressed the hand of each of his friends cheerfully and, with a parting good-bye, plunged head first into the onrushing waters.

Not even the man who claims that he made the trip can tell accurately what happened after that. His friends saw him disappear into the foam covered rapids. They watched for him to reappear, but the water roared on and they gave him up as lost.

Fate intervened and saved the daring man's life. He passed through the famous whirlpool, according to his story, but instead of being carried around and around and finally, instead of making that awful descent, into the maelstrom from which nothing that is human can arise, he was washed through the outlet and then, with strong, vigorous strokes, he swam on down the river to the Devil's Hole.

His friends dashed to the water's brink and dragged the form from the current. Glenister was unconscious, but it was found that life was not altogether extinct and with all speed he was carried back to Lewiston, where the work of reviving him was begun.

There are many persons here tonight who doubt that Glenister really made the trip through the awful waters, but the man who claims the distinction remains firm in his assertions.

"I made the trip," he said tonight, "and it does not seem fair for people who were not present and have no information on the subject to attempt to rob me of the credit. I had to work hard enough for it. Here are men who saw me make it. Their word ought to count for a little more than those who were nowhere around when I made the plunge."

Kalamazoo, Mich., Aug. 21.—F. B. McArthur, a stockholder from Saco, Mont., was stabbed in the stomach with a hatpin by an unknown woman on the streets here today. He was passing along on the sidewalk in a large crowd, when a small boy brushed a little feather duster in the woman's face. The

woman, thinking it was McArthur, grabbed her hatpin and jugged it into his stomach. McArthur cannot live. The identity of the woman is unknown.

G. A. R. men show their love for retired commander-in-chief of the army, and with rousing cheers unanimously adopt a resolution laudatory of General Miles. The resolution is as follows:

RESOLVED, That we congratulate that splendid soldier, exemplary commander, and patriotic citizen, General Nelson A. Miles, upon his attainment of a distinguished and honorable retirement, after a matchless record as a soldier of over forty-two years' service, without just criticism of his official conduct which began as a lieutenant in the Twenty-second Massachusetts Infantry, progressing by the brightest grade of heroic patriotism from Massachusetts to Appomattox, during the greatest of all civil wars, from 1861 to 1865, and illuminating this record by his great military achievement as a successful Indian fighter, and again as a gallant and judicious military disciplinarian and organizer.

Albany, Or., Aug. 21.—Dr. R. H. Curl was almost suffocated in a fire in his residence this morning. About 8 o'clock neighbors discovered the house on fire, and Dr. Curl, who was lying on a lounge in a deep sleep, was almost suffocated. His clothing was burned in several places, his face and hands were severely burned, and his body scorched. He says the fire started in his bedroom once during the night, but he awoke and extinguished it.

It is supposed that the first fire started from a lighted cigar, which he had placed on a chair, and the second fire started from the first. Dr. Curl was unable to give a clear statement of the facts. The police have taken him in charge, pending an investigation of the affair.

New York, Aug. 21.—If Lieutenant-Commander Iam Takeshira, of the Japanese Navy, carries out his plans, Japan will have a yacht in the next contest for the America's cup. The commander, who came over to see the struggle between Shamrock III and Reliance, declares he will interest financial men in his country to prepare at once for the building of a racer to enter the next international races.

"We can build just as fine a boat as either America or England," he said, "and you may be sure that at the next international races you will see the flag of Japan flying on the winner."

ON A BRIDGE.

CAUGHT CONVICT MURPHY OF FOLSOM, AT RENO.

Convict Sharky Gets Away—Officers Fire at Sharky but Fail to Bring Him Down—Both Were Heavily Armed—Other News.

Reno, Nev., Aug. 23.—Convict Joseph Murphy, who escaped from Folsom prison, was captured at ten o'clock tonight by Deputy Sheriff Sharky and Maxwell at the Virginia street bridge, crossing the Truckee River in Reno. Convict Frank Miller was with Murphy at the time, but jumped off the sidewalk into the willows, Sharky fired at him, the shot probably taking effect. Sharky and Dwight Jones followed Miller. Three more shots were fired at him, but he escaped in the darkness.

Murphy had a 48-caliber revolver on him when searched at the jail. He was very cunning and tried to get his hand on it. W. O. Craig arrived at the jail shortly after the arrest. He has followed the convicts from Rufflers.

Maxwell and Sharky acted bravely, as both convicts were heavily armed and saw the deputy sheriff just as they started to cross the bridge. Their first impulse was to turn back, but finally they decided to take the chances.

A large posse, headed by Sheriff Hayes and Deputies Sharky and Maxwell are now out on the trail of Miller. His capture is expected at any minute, as he is surrounded in the Willows on the bank of the Truckee River.

Fort Smith, Ark., Aug. 20.—The kidnaping of a young white girl, and the killing of one of the posse who tried to rescue her, are the crimes charged against a party of eight negroes tonight, fortified on Bruce's Island, sixteen miles west of here. The negroes are said to be well armed.

A few days ago two farmers living near Wilson's Rock, landed on Bruce's island in search of plums, and accidentally ran into a camp in which there were two negro men and a white girl about 12 years old. They made some inquiries about the girl, and the negroes said she was the daughter of a white man who was traveling with them, and who had gone to Fort Smith for provisions. The negroes would not let the girl take part in the conversation, and this aroused suspicion. A watch was kept on the negroes for two days, but no white man appeared.

Monday afternoon a party of farmers decided to investigate the case, and as they approached the island were fired upon by the negroes and one of the party, Roland by name, was killed. A sharp fight was kept up for some time, during which the girl escaped from the negroes and ran to the white men.

She was so excited that she could not give any intelligent account of herself. She said, however, that her father was not traveling with the negroes, but that she had been stolen from her home near Fort Gibson, I. T. She has been taken to Muldrew.

Roland, the dead man, was a comparative stranger at Wilson's Rock.

Bruce's island is in the center of the Arkansas River and contains about 25 acres. Posses of citizens left today for the scene of the trouble from Fort Smith, Spiro, Muldrew and Fort Gibson.

Portland Ore., Aug. 24.—Jesse E. Todd 27 years old, of 468 East Ninth street, was instantly killed in the darkness of early yesterday morning by being run over by gravel cars used for grading for the Oregon Water & Railway Company, on the East Side, opposite Ross Island.

When the fatality happened, only Todd and the engineer of the train were present, and it was Todd's duty to give a signal to the engineer to start the train by flashing a lighted lantern. The signal was given from a direction that was unexpected, and suddenly the engineersaw the lighted lamp between the cars. On stopping the train he found that Todd had disappeared and that the lamp dangled from a coupling pin. A short distance away, Todd's body was found, with the head severed from the body, the latter was badly cut. It is supposed that Todd missed his footing and either fell from a car, or between the cars.

His father is a surveyor in the Philippine Island, and his home in this country was at Forest Grove. Coroner Finley made an investigation into the case and found that the facts did not call for an inquest.

New York, Aug. 21.—A negro named Cody has successfully jumped from the structure of the new bridge being erected over Esst River, known as the Williamsburg bridge. It was a drop of 147 feet. He was picked up by a row boat and recovered consciousness an hour later. His body was protected from injury by padding. Cody jumped from the Brooklyn bridge a year ago.

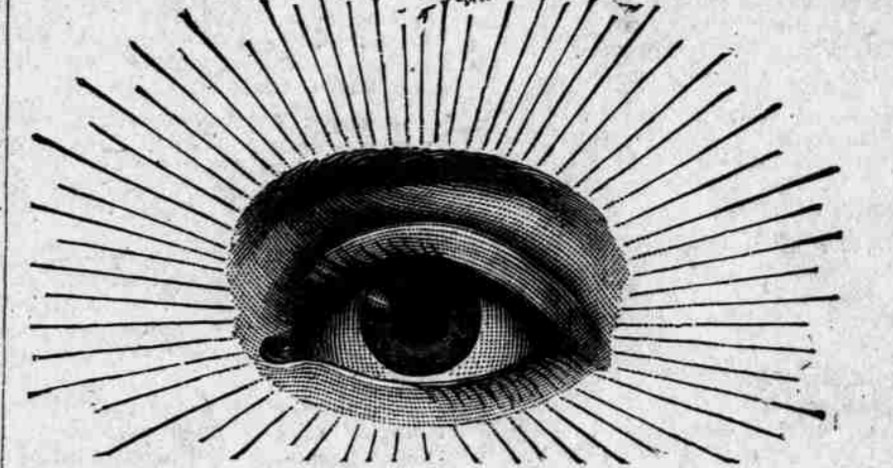
