

## HELD FOR MURDER

A FORMER PORTLAND WOMAN SUSPECTED OF POISONING HER HUSBAND.

Husband and Wife Had Quarreled Recently Because of the Attention Paid Her by a Laborer—Other News.

San Francisco, Aug. 29.—Mrs. Martin Bowers and her sister, Mrs. Z. C. Sutton, formerly of Portland, Or., are being held by the police of this city in connection with the death of Mrs. Bowers' husband, who died on Tuesday last, apparently from arsenical poison. It is alleged that after the death of her husband Mrs. Bowers withdrew several thousand dollars from the bank and deposited it in another concern in her own name, and that Mrs. Bowers and her husband had quarreled recently because of the attention paid by a laborer to the woman.

At the coroner's inquest a drug clerk testified that six days prior to the death of Bowers, Mrs. Sutton presented a prescription calling for arsenic. Dr. McLaughlin, whose name was attached to the prescription, denied having given such a prescription, and a writing expert gave it as his opinion that the prescription was written by Mrs. Bowers. She admitted having purchased medicine, but denied that it was arsenic. Mrs. Bowers, in a statement, admitted drawing the money from the bank, but added:

"I am innocent. I know nothing of any arsenic. I did not write that prescription."

Bowers was Mrs. Bowers' third husband. He was a bridge builder and a carpenter.

Today's developments in this story of crime have placed the sister in a more serious position. Circumstantial evidence is becoming so strong that it will be impossible, in the opinion of the police, for the woman to obtain their liberty without the formality of a trial.

A note book was among the effects found in Mrs. Bowers' room today. In a torn page of this note-book the paper on which the prescription for arsenic was written, it is said, fitted perfectly.

This find is looked upon by the police to be the culminating link in the chain of evidence woven about the woman.

Bowers died on Tuesday afternoon, after an illness of five weeks. A few hours before his death he was taken by Alta Lodge, I. O. O. F., against the wishes of his wife, to the German hospital. His death at once aroused suspicion, and Harry Bowers, a brother of the dead man, charged that he had been poisoned. His statement was in part corroborated on the following day by the city chemist, who found arsenic in the dead man's stomach to have killed six men, and now comes the forged prescription and the identification of Mrs. Sutton as the woman for whom the drug clerk filled it.

Mrs. Sutton who conducts a lodging house at 154 Eddy street, was taken into custody yesterday morning by Detective Thomas L. Ryan, after he secured the prescription from the drugstore conducted by J. Akenasky, at 301 Fifth street. G. S. Paterson, the clerk who filled it, was requested to go to the city prison, and he remained there until Mrs. Sutton arrived, with Mrs. Bowers, the dead man's wife; Mrs. Harry Bowers and Mrs. Sutton in line, he was asked to point out the woman who had purchased the poison.

"That is the woman," he said without hesitancy, as he indicated Mrs. Sutton. The woman gasped at the unexpected charge, but soon recovered her composure and sought to minimize the effect of the identification by making light of it. Mrs. Sutton is a tall comely woman, a trifle slender than her sister, but of much the same appearance. When taken to the prison she was dressed in mourning. A heavy black veil concealed her features, but as she became excited she cast it aside.

Mrs. Sutton was reared in Portland, Or., where she married her present husband. He divides his time between the stage and the bar. Part of this time he is employed as a vocalist and at other times as a bartender. She states that they have not lived together for several years, and that she does not know his present whereabouts.

Mrs. Elizabeth Byers, of 435 East Burnside, Portland, Or., is mother of Mrs. Z. C. Sutton and Mrs. Bowers, held for the murder of Bowers. Mrs. Byers' husband died some time ago, leaving some money to his family.

## ONE BANDIT CAUGHT.

GANG THAT WAS TO HOLD UP THE GREAT NORTHERN.

Frank Baker Did Not See Them Go, and is Captured on the Train by Stock Inspector Hall, who Knew Him.

BUTTE Mont, Aug. 30.—A Miner special from Havre says: Stock Inspector George W. Hall captured Frank Baker, one of the Curry gang, who had, it is alleged, planned to hold up the west-bound flyer at Malta this morning, and would have captured the other two members of the gang had not the sight of the numerous Pinkerton detectives flushed the game.

The company had positive information that the hold-up would occur near Wagner, where the famous hold-up of two years ago occurred. Hall spotted his three men at Malta and boarded the train at the same time the outlaws did. One man boarded the blind baggage, another climbed onto the rear end and a third walked into the day coach and took a seat.

As the east and west bound trains met at Malta, the east bound pulled in just as the west bound train pulled out. Immediately a dozen detectives and special service men armed with Winchesters jumped off the incoming train, and part of them made for the express car and climbed in.

The robber on the rear end saw them, swung off the rear coach, ran up to the front of the train, told his accomplice the game was off, and they both made their escape. Hall had in the meantime cached himself in one of the closets of the coach where the third robber was sitting, being fearful that Baker would recognize him.

The outlaw did not see his pals leave the train and was arrested in the car. Baker is a cowboy, and it is said, has been arrested several times for horse stealing. Baker's identity as one of the robbers has been positively established, it is alleged, by the contents of a satchel found by Hall.

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 30.—The protest against the further extension of forest reserve in Oregon recently issued by the Roseburg Board of Trade, is already meeting with favorable endorsement. Among these is the following letter just received from Representative J. N. Williamson:

"The Dalles, Or., Aug. 26.—W. W. Cardwell, Esq., Secretary Roseburg Board of Trade, Roseburg, Or. Dear Sir—I am this day in receipt of your letter of August 25, containing copy of resolutions recently passed by your Board of Trade in reference to the creation of new forest reserves in Oregon.

"I am in full and complete sympathy with the sentiment expressed in the resolution. I hope we may be able to stay this forest reserve craze—that seems to have complete possession of the Interior Department under the Administration. I believe that some of our forests should be reserved. However, like many other good things, it should not be over done."

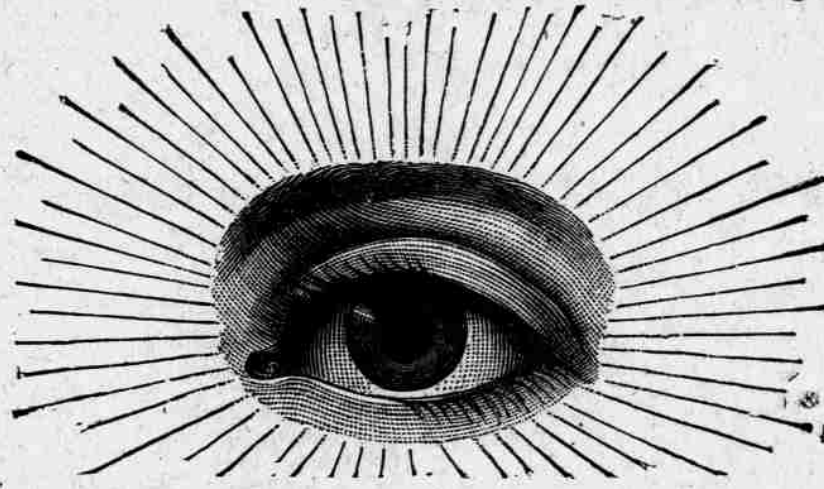
