## MAKES ANOTHER OFFER.

Water Company Does—Sixteen Thousand and Asked for Water Plant.

The Corvallis Water Company made a new proposition to the city. It was submitted to the council at a special meeting Monday night. It is based on a ten years' contract, and proposes a considerable extension of the system. In the improvements larger water mains are proposed on several streets, carrying the equipment for fire protection to a much wider extent. The city is allowed to put in all the fire hydrants it wants to at its own expense, and the total charge for water for fire protection, street sprinkling and sewer flushing is to be \$50 per month. The city is to have the option of purchase at any time after five years at a price of \$16,000 for the present plant, plus the Portland cost of any improvements made. The proposed extension of the system is estimated to cost over \$2,000. The offer was referred to a committee consisting of Avery, Henkle and Rose.
