STILL IN FLAMES.

REST OF ABERDEEN BURNS AND FIREMEN ARE HELPLESS.

Glasgo Block, Blecker Block, Postoffice, and Young Mou's Christian Association and Commercial Block Burns Fire Spreads Rapfdly.

Aberdeen, Wash., Oct. 28 -A fire which promises to equal in magnitude the recent holocaust, which destroyed the major portion of the business part of Aberdeen, is now raging, and the fire department is wholly unable to cope with it.

At an early hour this morning fire was discovered in the center of the Commercial block. With in-describable rapidity it has spread to the Glasgow block, the postoffice, the B-cker block and the Y. M. C. A. building, ell of which are now a mass of flames.

The fire department is utterly powerless to stay the progress of the flames, which the wind is fast driving toward the unburned portion of the town.

The Commercial block contained 10 stores, besides several which opened temporary quarters there after the recent fire.

Seven business blocks of Aberdeen were destroyed by a fire that broke out on the morning of October 16 and burn-d until two o'clock in the afternoon. The bleze started in a rookery called the mock building, where men cooked their meals over gaseline stoves. Four men lost their lives and a half dozen more or less seriously injured.
