**LOGAN'S JURY**

In Portland, the other day, Judge Bellinger and his court were amazed by a jury that returned a verdict of acquittal for Abe Logan, after another jury on weaker evidence had convicted Albert Martin of manslaughter, for the murder of Indian Grant at Siletz. The judge gave expression to his surprise and mortification by declaring that by the acquittal of Logan, justice had been cheated, and that at least a verdict of manslaughter should have been rendered.

The jury system is one of the things in our life of liberty that we vaunt. And there was a time in the days of tyrants and tyranny, when its possession was a privilege of which to boast. With the evolution of civilization, however it begins to show faults, and the greatest of these is the uncertainty that always attends the deliberations of a body of men. Legislatures made up of the alleged talent of the state, sometimes do unheard of things. They rarely fail to do some things that never ought to be done, and that in saner moments the legislators acting individually would never do. The congress of this country in a moment of passion, led on by Sumner and Phillips put the ballot in the hands of the negro, now acknowledged to have been a most irrational and senseless act. Instances, both multiplied and astonishing of the same character are constantly happening both in and out of jury rooms, so when seven men for conviction yield to five in a Portland court and turn a murderer loose unpunished and unblamed, it is not a circumstance to wonder at. It has been done before and it will be done again.

One jury convicts a guilty man of murder in the first degree, another hears his case under a new trial and perhaps gives him a couple of years, while a third called to pass on the same case, sends him out of court with an acquittal, an apology for the laws long delay, and with the blessing of the jurors.

Accordingly, when Martin goes to prison for manslaughter and Logan, free as a bird and blameless as a flower, goes back to the scene of his homicide, the public will know that justice was partial, but since it was the work of juries, it cannot be helped, and need not surprise.

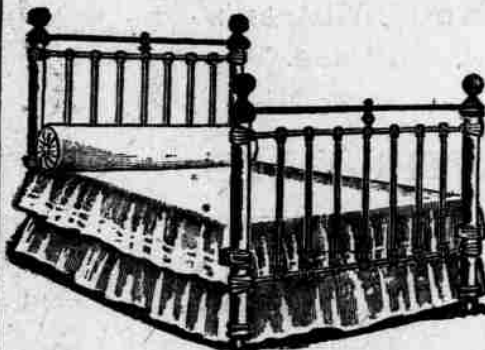

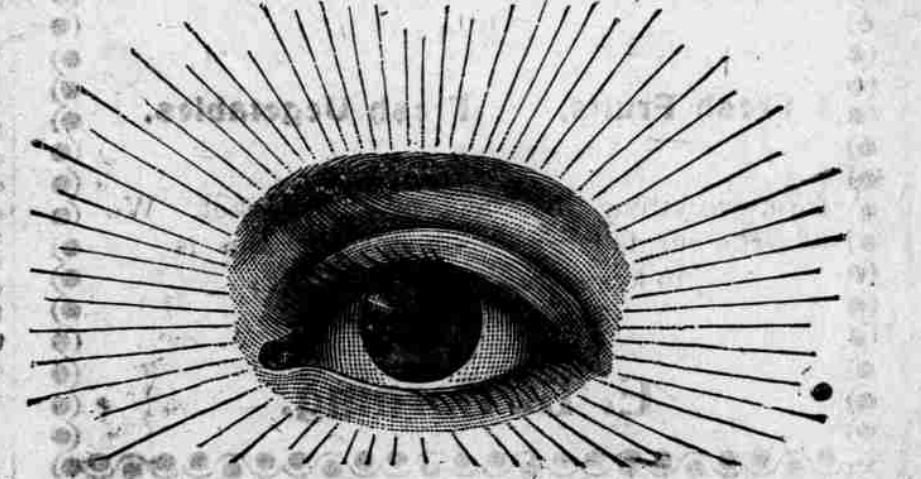
