BENTON SCHOOLS.

Will Send Exhibit to St. Louis Exposition—What the Plan is.

A movement is on foot to have all the schools in Benton county represented in an exhibit at the St. Louis exposition next year. In response to a circular letter issued by State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman, professors Sheldon and Young of the State University, Professor Justus Eurnham, of Portland, J. C. Z. user, of The Dalles, J. T. Nowlin, of Pendleton and H. R. Lyman, of Astoria, the following committee has been appointed by County School Superintendent Denman to act with him in securing a suitable school exhibit from Benton county. President Emerick of Philomath College, President Baldwin of the college of Philomath, Principal S. I. Pratt of the Philomath high school, Principal S. W. Holmes, of the Corvallis high school, and professor J. B. Horner of the State Agricultural College. Yesterday at a meeting of the committee held at the court house it was decided to place the matter at once before all the teachers and school boards of the county in securing a choice educational exhibit as can be collected by the twentieth of January, at which time the committee will meet at the school superintendent's office for the purpose of receiving and preparing the exhibit for shipment.

The committee favors the following scheme:

First.—Photographs showing school houses, rooms, grounds, interesting and picturesque surroundings, and especially showing pupils at their studies at play, at their recreations or upon excursions.

Second.—Map: Plan of the state on a scale of one half inch to the mile of school district draws to a scale of two inches to the mile; district maps to show water courses, roads, timber, prairie and hill lands, and every town and farm residence, with marginal data of school; typographical maps and models of school buildings and grounds, especially higher institutions, greatly desired. Product maps of state, or general resources, geology, etc. are very desirable.

Third.—Pupils work: regular daily work on paper of uniform size, eight by ten inches with inner margin of one and one fourth inches, suitable to be bound into neat volumes.

Fourth.—Pupils language work: for essays or language work as in geography and natural history, much that is striking and peculiar will be available. Descriptions by pupils of their school districts, including surface, resources, land and water distributions, occupation and industries, history, household stories of adventure and pioneer days, native legends and myths will all be fittingly described.

Fifth.—Manual work by pupil: Paper folding, clay modeling and raffia work.

Sixth.—Specimens: In botany and natural history, and work in drawing and color sketches mounted on paper of standard size.

NO LAW TO PUNISH.

Those who Give Liquor to Minors—What this Writer Says of it.

In the case of the City of Corvallis vs. Mary Smith for giving to a minor malt liquor in violation of a City ordinance, Judge Benson sustained a demurrer to the complaint, holding that the city did not have the authority to pass such an ordinance, that the crime was only cognizable by the general laws of the state. Section 37 of charter says: "The council has power within the city:—To license, tax, regulate and restrain bar-keepers, saloonkeepers, dealers in spirituous or malt liquors, bar rooms, drinking shops, or places where spirituous or malt liquors are kept for sale or in any manner disposed of and the sale and disposal thereof" "nor shall any provisions of law concerning the sale or disposal of spirituous or malt liquors in Benton county apply to the sale or disposition of the same in the City of Corvallis." This provision of the charter is now held by the judge to only apply to bar-keepers, etc. and not to any individual person. In short, the City only has power over recognized persons such as saloon and bar-keepers, dealers, etc. and not persons outside of those designated in the charter. So as the matter stands a private person can not be prosecuted either under the state law or the city law. It is sometimes a great privilege in life where one is amenable to no law. Any individual, so he is not in the privileged class can sell or give away spirituous malt or any other kind of drinks and answer to no law.

The query naturally is, "What is the city going to do?" Why in justice should a poor saloon keeper be cinched and a private person be excepted from the penalties of the law?

Price; "How can our teachers arouse greater interest on part of parents and pupils," Earl Brown, Meldora Jackson, Walter Winniford; "What constitutes a good director?" H. L. Bush and T. L. Read; "Influence of parents in governing the school," W. L. Price; "What should the public school do for our boys and girls."

This being the first meeting of the character held in the Valley, it promises to be one of the best. Good interest prevails on part of teachers, parents and officers. The meeting is to begin precisely at 10:30 o'clock a. m. It is the intention of Supt. Danman to hold the meeting rain or shine. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1.

Resolved by the Senate, the House concurring that the following article, as an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Oregon, be proposed and referred to the next legislative assembly, and if the same shall be concurred in by a majority of all the members elected to each House thereof, and shall afterwards be ratified by a majority of the electors of the State, then the same shall be a part of the Constitution of the State of Oregon: Article 1. That Article XII, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, be and the same is hereby amended, and in lieu thereof shall be inserted the following: The Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon is hereby empowered to provide by law for the election of a State Printer, to provide for his compensation, and to prescribe his powers and duties.
