HOW TO PREPARE IT.

Benton County's School Exhibit for the St. Louis Exposition.

The committee in charge of the school exhibit for the St. Louis exhibit has formulated a plan, and a circular letter has been sent all teachers by Supt. Denman with suggestions as to the character of work wanted for the display. The materials must be sent to the superintendent's office not later than January 26th. The plan of the exhibit is as follows:

First—Photographs showing school houses, room, grounds, and interesting and picturesque surroundings, and especially showing pupils at work, at play, at their recreation or upon excursions.

Second—Maps, plan of state on a scale of half inch to a mile; of school district drawn on a scale of two inches to a mile; district map to show water courses, roads, timber, prairie and hill land, and every town and farm residence, with marginal date of school; topographical maps and models of school buildings and grounds, especially higher institutions greatly desired. Product maps of state.

Third—Pupils' work, regular daily work on paper of uniform size 8x10 inches with inner margin of one and one-fourth inches.

Fourth—Language work; original stories, essays, themes in geography and natural history, descriptions of school district, etc.

Fifth—Nature studies with cabinets of Oregon woods and other cabinet displays.

CAUGHT FROM HORSE

BRIDE OF A WEEK DIED FROM AN ATTACK OF GLANDERS

While Her Pet Horse Was Suffering From the Disease, She Rode It to Town to Purchase Her Wedding Outfit—Other News.

Bridgeport, Conn., Dec. 3.—Mrs Richard F. Mueller, bride of a week, died of glanders last night. She caught the dread disease, always fatal to humans, from her pet horse, which she drove to this city while preparing her trousseau. Her symptoms were obscure, but an expert who was called in positively declares that she suffered from glanders or farcy, which, as most people know, is communicable to man from horses and mules which are primarily affected with it.

M. S. Mueller was Emma Richell, daughter of Frederick Richell, who lives near Bridgeport. Whenever she drove to town, she herself harnessed, unharnessed and tended her horse, which lately showed unmistakable signs of glanders. About the middle of last month she drove here to buy garments she needed for her wedding outfit. On Nov. 21 she fell ill. Dr. A. A. Holmes was summoned and found his patient suffering from acute rheumatism apparently. Her joints were red and swollen, she suffered considerable pain and her temperature ran up to the dangerous point, 104 degrees.

Dr. Holmes treated her for rheumatism, and in four days all her symptoms but the fever subsided. Every one believed she would soon recover and she was married to Mr. Mueller in her father's house on Thanksgiving day.

Last night she died after a return of her original symptoms. When her young husband learned there was no hope for her his grief was overwhelming. Today the health officer quarantined her father's residence and its inmates.
