TODAYS CONVENTION.

Men who Will sit as Deleg tes Con venes in Court House at Neven.

The county convention of Benton democrats is to convene in the court house at 11 today. It promises to be one of the old time gatherings of the unterrified. The list of delegates includes names of men of business who have not been prominent in party councils for years. Some of them are in a Benton convention for the first time. All were elected at primaries held throughout the

county last Tuesday. The attendence of voters in the four Corvallis precincts was very light, due to the fact that there is no rivalry so far as known for places on the ticket. The pre-eminent fitness of some of the men now in office for re-election for the places they are filling, and the well known custom of Benton county people to reward faithful men by a re-election seems to make it a generally accepted belief that several present encumbents will be re-nominated. In the cases of other places on the ticket, the acknowledged majority of the opposition makes men chary of hunting a nomination and rather leads all to allow the office to seek the man. These facts led to open primaries with no contests for places as delegates interested in securing the nomination of particular candidates.
